

# MISS MACKIE TAKES GOLF FINAL, 7 AND 6

## Stages Rally at Cherry Valley to Defeat Mrs. Untermeyer for Metropolitan Title

GARDEN CITY, L. I., Aug. 18—

Despite the fact that she was 4 down after the first six holes, Miss Peggy Mackie of Inwood won the Women's Metropolitan Golf Association championship at the Cherry Valley Club today by defeating Mrs. Sophie Untermeyer of Century, 7 and 6, in the scheduled thirty-six-hole final.

Putting brilliantly, Miss Mackie ended the morning session with a margin of 4 up after playing the second nine in par 36. Maintaining her fine control, Miss Mackie accounted for a 36 on the outgoing half this afternoon to increase her advantage to 6 up. Three holes later she capped her bid for the highest golfing honors she has acquired since she began competition approximately twenty years ago.

Daughter of Jack Mackie, one of the founders of the Professional Golfers Association of America and professional at the Inwood Country Club until he retired recently, Miss Mackie was a finalist in the Long Island championship this season and took the medal in the metropolitan Monday. As a junior she won the metropolitan girls' title twice and played on the boys' golf team when she attended Lawrence High.

She recalled a humorous experience when she competed in the girls' tourney some years back at Englewood. "I can't forget that because I took 152 for a round. I put a ball in a mound of hay and didn't know the rules and kept on hitting the ball and hay for a long time."

The successor to Mrs. Reinert Torgerson, whom she vanquished in yesterday's semi-finals, was quite a different competitor today. Mrs. Untermeyer, finalist on two previous occasions, began as if her third bid for the crown would bring success.

The Westchester golfer won the first three holes with 4s. Mrs. Untermeyer one-putted the initial five greens and then captured the sixth with a 5, where Miss Mackie was bunkered, to be 4 up.

That proved the last hole in the match that Mrs. Untermeyer won.

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For the next twenty-four, halves were the best she could get. On the other hand, Miss Mackie turned the tide by annexing six in a row starting the seventh. This meant that at the end of the first nine Mrs. Untermeyer was still 1 up.

Miss Mackie evened matters at the tenth and then assumed a lead she never relinquished, with a 4 at the eleventh. She became 2 up at the twelfth.

They halved the next three as Miss Mackie one-putted on each green, Mrs. Untermeyer accounting for a splendid 3 at the fifteenth after hitting the pin with her approach. At the sixteenth Mrs. Untermeyer was bunkered on her second and failed to recover on her initial attempt, ending with a 6. Miss Mackie's 4 there put her 3 up.

Both had 4s at the seventeenth and then at the par 3 eighteenth Miss Mackie chipped up well for a 3, while Mrs. Untermeyer, after playing her approach from a ridge paralleling the clubhouse, took a 4.

With a 76 to Mrs. Untermeyer's 81, Miss Mackie had established a 4-up advantage. She had 26 putts to 27 for Mrs. Untermeyer for the eighteen holes.

### Retains Keen Putting Touch

During the second phase of the match Miss Mackie did not lose the keen touch on the greens that was so important in her victory. The speed with which she hit her putts was one of the sidelights.

After they halved the nineteenth with 4s, Miss Mackie rolled in a ten-footer to become 5 up at the twentieth. She knocked in an 18-footer for a birdie 3 to add to her advantage at the twenty-first.

Mrs. Untermeyer had the misfortune of having putts go in and out of the cup on three critical holes. One of these was at the twenty-second, where Miss Mackie carded a 4. Mrs. Untermeyer's putt for a 3 rolled around the rim and stayed out. The next two also were halved. Both were trapped in the deep bunker to the right of the seventh green of the course, the twenty-fifth of the match, on their tee shots. Miss Mackie holed a 4, while Mrs. Untermeyer's subsequent recovery left her only four feet from the pin. She thought she sank the ball, after her putt, but the pellet dipped in and then came out.

The best Mrs. Untermeyer could do at the next two was to match Miss Mackie's 4s. Miss Mackie was out in 36 to Mrs. Untermeyer's 38 and led by 6 up after the twenty-seventh.

Both three-putted for 6s at the twenty-eighth and Miss Mackie posted a 4 at the twenty-ninth, where Mrs. Untermeyer was short with her second and took a 5.

At the thirtieth, Miss Mackie put her third to the right of the green, pitched on the accounted for a 6. Mrs. Untermeyer was on in 3, but three-putted to end the match, after her putt for a 5 had rimmed the cup.
