

Mrs. Korber Re-Elected President at Golf Group Meeting

WOMEN GOLFERS RETAIN OFFICERS

Slate Headed by Mrs. Korber
Is Named for Another Term
by Metropolitan Group

NEW TOURNEY PROPOSED

Round Robin Probably Will Be
Added—118 Clubs Are on
Roster of Association

Mrs. Josephine Windle Korber of the Women's National Golf and Tennis Club was re-elected president of the Women's Metropolitan Golf Association at the annual meeting of the latter organization at the Hotel Biltmore yesterday.

The other officers, Mrs. Wright D. Goss Jr. of Baltusrol, vice president; Mrs. Joseph C. Thoms of Essex County, secretary, and Mrs. R. M. Torgerson of Lakeville, treasurer, also were all named for a second term.

Three new members were chosen for the executive committee: Mrs. Richard Hellman of the Scarsdale Golf Club, Mrs. W. A. Blount of Rockaway Hunt and Miss Barbara Hunter of the Knollwood Country Club. Those re-elected to the committee were Mrs. E. G. Richmond, Cherry Valley; Miss Janet Douglas, Rumson C. C., and Mrs. Charles Whitehead, Plainfield C. C. Mrs. Torgerson was chairman of the nominating committee which presented the slate.

Five Rounds in Proposal

Although the association annually has a heavy tournament schedule, it was indicated yesterday by Mrs. Korber that a new type of competition may appear on next season's calendar. It is a round robin tournament which would consist of five rounds of match play and for which only low handicap players of the district would be eligible. The leading women golfers in this area sanction the idea.

The suggestion for this tournament was made to the executive board by Mrs. Goss, former national finalist, and it is likely that the idea will be adopted, although approval of the low handicap golfers will be sought first. The eligibles for this tournament, it has been suggested, would be players with handicaps of four or less and the actual number of competitors would be limited to sixteen.

Several courses were offered by attending delegates for the association's various tournaments and these recommendations will be acted upon shortly by the executive board. Old Oaks and Briar Hills appeared to be the leading bidders for the association championship, while Pomonok, Century, Dunwoodie, North Shore, Plandome, Monmouth and Rockaway Hunt went on record as being willing to act as host to "any" of the tournaments.

Team Tourneys Included

These include the brother-and-sister, husband-and-wife, mother-and-daughter and mother-and-son tournaments. Crestmont also bid for the husband-and-wife tourney and Mountain Ridge for the brother-and-sister. The championship is tentatively slated to be held during the week of June 2.

Various committee reports disclosed that the organization has a membership of 118 clubs, the latest initiates being the Powelton Country Club and the East Orange Golf Association. The treasurer's report revealed a deficit of \$255.93 for the year, but a balance on hand of \$4,939.72.

Tournament golfers were urged to submit five of their best scores to the handicap committee in order that they might receive the correct handicap in the general revision that is to be made before next Spring. It was announced that the mother-and-daughter tournament would not be changed so that "daughters-in-law" might be permitted to take part in this championship.
