

New York Women's Team Subdues Philadelphia, 9-6, in Golf Match

Upsets Defenders in Opening Battle of the Griscom Cup Series—

Mrs. Thorne Halts Mrs. Lack, Runner-Up for Eastern Title—Mrs. Dietrich Loses to Miss Quier.

WINCHESTER, Mass., June 11.—By the same score that they lost to Philadelphia on the final day of the intersectional Griscom Cup team matches in Philadelphia last year, the New York players turned the tables at the Winchester Country Club today, defeating the defending champions, 9 to 6.

The winners, having greater strength in the lower team places, will complete the triangular event when they play Boston on Saturday, while Philadelphia engages the home team tomorrow.

The New York victory, coming as it did after Philadelphia had just walked off with the honors in the women's Eastern championship, was a distinct surprise, especially as seven of the fifteen New Yorkers arrived only in time to play, and had no experience on the course.

New Champion Triumphs

Too much competition the last three days proved a boomerang, however, to several of the Philadelphians. Although Miss Edith Quier, the new Eastern champion, continued her fine play to defeat Mrs. Henry Dietrich, the New York leader, 4 and 3, Mrs. Norman Lack lost the No. 2 match to Mrs. Jonathan Thorne, last year's metropolitan champion, at 2 and 1.

Mrs. Lack just couldn't produce the fine edge of accuracy that distinguished her game during the championship and gave her the runner-up post. Mrs. Thorne, who arrived here last night, played beautifully after the first few holes, to be even at the turn. She then negotiated several sub-par holes, coming in to gain the lead and then end the match on the seventeenth green.

Mrs. Edward Stevens, continuing the steady play she has shown all

week, defeated Mrs. J. J. Mitchell, 2 and 1, in the third battle, but Miss Helen Buck evened the count for Philadelphia by trouncing Miss Rosalie Knapp, 6 and 5. Mrs. Karl Scheidt put Philadelphia ahead when she won from Miss Ruth Adel, 1 up, at the home hole, then Miss Jane Douglas pulled New York up even by defeating Mrs. H. R. Stetson, 6 and 4.

Mrs. Hockenjos Is Victor

From there, however, New York was definitely superior. Mrs. William Hockenjos Jr., Miss Betty Buechner, Mrs. F. J. Holleran, Mrs. G. E. Peterson, Mrs. G. E. Hackney and Mrs. J. J. Lawlor all were New York victors.

Miss Quier was out in 41, to be 3 up at the turn over Mrs. Dietrich's 43. Even though the new metropolitan champion then settled down to the best golf she has played here, she couldn't compete with Miss Quier's greater length off the tee.
