

Untermeyer, Mackie in Met Golf Title Final

GARDEN CITY, Aug. 17.—Peggy Mackie, the medalist from Inwood, will meet Mrs. Sophie Untermeyer of Century in the 36-hole final for the Women's Metropolitan golf championship here tomorrow on the Cherry Valley course.

Miss Mackie, whose 77 paced the field in the qualifying round of the Met title event here Monday, achieved a 3 and 2 victory over the defending champion, Mrs. Ruth Torgerson, playing on her home course.

Mrs. Untermeyer reached the last bracket with a 5 and 4 victory over 19-year-old Dorothy Lowenstein of Fenway Golf Club, the sensational performer of the week. It is the third time Mrs. Untermeyer has reached the final where twice before she lost—here at Cherry Valley in 1940 to Mrs. Harry McNaughton and last year at Sleepy Hollow to Mrs. Torgerson.

Miss Mackie made the turn in 39 to be 1 up on the doughty former champion, ending Mrs. Torgerson's two-year reign over the local golfing ladies. Mrs. Torgerson was out in 40.

The home player squared the match at the 11th when Miss Mackie trapped her approach, and it looked like the old story of previous matches between the pair, when Mrs. Torgerson came through in the closing holes.

Birdie Two on 15th Sews Up Match.

But not this time. On the 13th, Mrs. Torgerson trapped her drive, played her second safe and ended up with a 6 to go one down. On the same hole Miss Mackie got a lucky break when her topped approach shot hit the pin and stopped dead (no penalty in match play).

The ex-champion then took three to get down from the edge on the 14th to go two down, and Miss Mackie sewed up the match by holing a 10-footer for a birdie 2 on the short 15th. Peggy also came out of a trap on the 16th to stave off her rival's rally.

Mrs. Untermeyer started 5-6 today—three over par—but was lucky to split the holes with Miss Lowenstein, whose chipping and putting, her mainstay all week in a series of tough matches, was away off. Sophie then settled down to score a 41 for the first nine to be four up.

Miss Lowenstein won the 10th with a par 5, but lost the 11th to a birdie 3 and scrambled up the 12th to score a 6 and go five down. They halved the next two in 4's.
