# Women's Eastern Golf Crown

## Is Won by Miss Collett

### With a Total Score of 250

#### MISS COLLETT WINS CROWN WITH A 250

Regains Eastern Golf Title,  
Which She Held in 1922, 1923  
and 1924, by Four Strokes.

#### MRS. HURD FINISHES SECOND

National Champion in 1909  
Plays Fine Golf to Lead  
Many Junior Contestants.

#### MISS ORCUTT, 264, IS NEXT

Met. Titleholder Ten Strokes Back  
of Mrs. Hurd—Mrs. Baker of  
Boston, 267, Fourth.

WAVERLEY, Mass., June 8.—As was forecast yesterday when she broke the course record at the Belmont Spring Country Club with an 80, giving her a lead of seven strokes on her nearest rival, Miss Glenna Collett again is the Women's Eastern Golf association champion after a lapse of two years.

Her aggregate score for the fifty-four holes played since Monday is 250 strokes, putting her four strokes ahead of Mrs. Dorothy Hurd, who was the only one in the field within hailing distance of the winner when the championship came to a close today.

The victory, virtually emblematic of the year's medal play championship, was the third which the new resident of New York has scored since the season started and likewise marks the fourth time that she has gained the Eastern title, her other triumphs having been scored on three successive occasions, starting in 1922.

She now holds the Nassau and the North and South championships in addition to her newly won honors and appears destined to become almost as much of a monopolist as Bobby Jones.

#### Mrs. Hurd's Fine Record.

It is worthy of comment that in spite of all that has been written about the younger generation in golf, the only rival Miss Collett had for the Eastern title was Mrs. Hurd, a disciple of the old school, a woman who learned her golf abroad and who won the national championship as far back as 1909, nearly twenty years ago.

Her 83 was the best score turned in today and enabled her to pick up three of the seven-stroke deficit with which she started the final round. With a three-day total of 254, the Philadelphia woman led Miss Maureen Orcutt, the metropolitan champion, by ten strokes at the finish.

A mere mite of a woman, Mrs. E. H. Baker Jr., the Boston champion, finished fourth with 267, two strokes ahead of her junior rival in the district, Miss Ruth Batchelder, who was tied with Mrs. J. L. Anderson of Cherry Valley at 269.

#### Miss Collett Loses 4 Strokes.

Miss Collett's 86 was somewhat of a disappointment after yesterday's performance. Still it was more or less natural that with a seven-stroke lead there should be a letdown. In spots her golf was just as good, but there was a certain amount of slackness that was not in evidence yesterday. She was out of bounds twice, once at the eighth and again at the eighteenth, and those misfortunes accounted for four strokes.

Then there were two three-putt greens, one on No. 7 and another on No. 15, and on the eleventh, after putting a mashie up to within eighteen inches of the hole for a birdie 3, she missed the putt.

Except for these mistakes, none of them necessary, she would have had a score that would have outdistanced Mrs. Hurd and spread-eagled the field. Her start was not as auspicious as it has been, for she took 5s on the first two holes, where she had 4s the other two days. Then she took a 4 on the short third.

The 5 on the 500-yard No. 4 was not bad, although she has had two 4s there. She missed the fifth green with her mashie and took 5 there, and after a 5 on the first of the meadow holes she took three putts on the one uphill.

That disturbed her, and playing the eighth she pushed her drive to the rough and tried to cut the ball around some trees with her spoon. The outcome was a ball out of bounds, and she took a 5 at the hole.

Out in 43, she took three from the edge of the tenth, bunkered herself at the short twelfth, missed a short putt for a 5 on the fourteenth, took three putts on the fifteenth, was short at the sixteenth and then out of bounds on her drive to the eighteenth.

Mrs. Hurd, playing with Miss Orcutt, likewise got away to a bad start, topping her second and taking 6 for the first hole. A good 4 on the second was followed by another 4 at the third, where she was bunkered off her drive.

After getting her 5 on the long hole, she missed the green with her second shot to the fifth, her ball rolling down onto the sixth tee and leaving her with a difficult approach. Getting on she took three putts for another 6 there. Three 5s and a 3, on the ninth, left her out in 44 and still seven shots back of Miss Collett.

**Then Plays Fine Golf.**

From there on, however, Mrs. Hurd played fine golf for her 40 in spite of her inability to make timely use of either of the two short holes.

As has been true of her play all week, Miss Orcutt again drove beautifully today, several of her tee shots causing the gallery to gasp with amazement. Many of her second shots were not all that could be desired, but where she lost strokes was around the green. That and her putting are weak links in her otherwise perfect game.

If she only had the pitch-and-run shot down and if she were more firm in the left wrist on her chip shots and a little less careless on the greens, she would be, no doubt, one of the finest golfers that the world has ever seen.

Her first drive was far up the hill and well past the 200-yard mark, yet all she got on the hole was a 5, due to a pushed second shot into the rough. After a 4 at the second she

unclubbed herself playing the third hole with the wind against and three-putted the green after recovering well. Three more putts cost her a 5 on the fifth, and that was followed by a pair of useless 6s, the last due to a missed drive.

**Does Well at Seventh.**

Her potential strength as a golfer was fully demonstrated at the seventh, where she was home with a drive and a spoon. After that she hit a par only once and her score for the round was the same as yesterday's.

Mrs. Anderson's score was ruined in the beginning when she started out with a 7 and 8 at the first two holes. The 7 came from a missed second shot and also a chip shot and three putts, while the 8 came from being bunkered on her second shot, taking two to get out, and three more putts.

With the championship decided and Boston a winner of the Osgood Shield for the best aggregated scores for the five days in the different districts, the competition for the Griscom Cup will start tomorrow with New York meeting Philadelphia.

**Miss Orcutt the Leader.**

The metropolitan team will be headed by Miss Orcutt, the other members being Mrs. Anderson, Mrs. Smith, Miss Jenney, Mrs. DuBois, Mrs. MacGowan, Mrs. Burrowes, Miss Knapp, Mrs. Toerge, the Princess Lobkowitz, Mrs. H. A. Jackson, Mrs. Stevenson, Mrs. J. H. Lapham, Miss Bishop and Mrs. Stevens.

The loser will play Boston on Friday and the winners will meet on Saturday in the final encounter.

Boston's score in the Osgood Shield competition was 1,322, New York finishing with 1,345 and Philadelphia third with 1,347.

Miss Knapp was the winner of the three-day low net prize with a score of 249 and Mrs. G. L. Wrenn finished second with 251. Mrs. Anderson won the selected score prize with a score of 39, 37-76.
