Mrs. Percy Pyne 3rd and her 23 year-old son, John, of Somerset Hills, were the winners. Competition is always keen in this event and the Pyne's 36-37-73 was just one stroke ahead of Mrs. Maurice Moore and Maurice Jr., Rockville Links, who had 38-36-74. The Pynes offset four bogies and a double bogey with four birdies. Mrs. Pyne is an eight handicap player and John, the eldest of four sons, is a seven. Two other teams broke 80. Mrs. John Rudnick and Steve, Green Brook, had 40-37-77, and Mrs. Allan Becker and Stephen, Westchester, had 38-40-78. Tied at 80 were Mrs. M. H. Higgins and Michael, Upper Montclair, 39-41-80; and Mrs. Urban Finnerty and Robert, Essex Fells, 41-39-80. The first low net prize in this selected-drive, alternate shot tourney went to Mrs. Becker and Stephen with 78-17-61. Mrs. N. Botstein and Gary, Shackamaxon, scored 81-18-63 for second low net. Third low net went to Mrs. Moore and Maurice with 74-7-67. Mrs. George Simson and Paul, who won the championship last year in a playoff with Mrs. Reynolds and her son, did not defend. In addition to the Botsteins, 81's were also posted by Mrs. Raymond Topol and John, Elmwood, and Mrs. Grant Sanger and Mike, Stanwich.

PLAYOFF VICTORY FOR LINNEY'S IN BROTHER-SISTER CHAMPIONSHIP

Kathy and Jim Linney, Plainfield, captured the 36th Sister-Brother Championship at Richmond County C C on July 17 after an 18 hole playoff for the title.

At the end of play on the original day of the tournament both Kathy and Jim Linney and Cindy and Steve Ferro, Forest Hill, had carded identical scores of 40-38-78. According to Women's Metropolitan Golf Association rules, when a championship crown is involved the players must return again for an 18 hole match. And so they did. This time, however, a champion was crowned. The Linney's fired a superb round of 38-35-73 against Cindy and Steve Ferro's 43-45-88.

Returning to the original day of play — four strokes away from the leaders were Mrs. Andrew J. Wallace and her twin brother, Michael Higgins, Upper Montclair, with 40-42-82. Turning in a score of 40-43-83 was the team of Mrs. Manny Doppelt and Mr. B. Tamis, Brae Burn. Mrs. J. B. Cralle, Montclair, brought her brother, James Robb, all the way from San Jose, California, to play in this tournament and they posted a 42-43-85. Another young team, Miss Maureen Finnerty and Donald, Essex Fells, scored 43-44-87. One more team in the field of fifteen broke ninety — Mrs. June Ugelow and her brother, Mr. L. Feldman, Glen Oaks, 43-45-88. First low net of 69 went to Mrs. Wallace and Mr. Higgins on the draw. Second low net on the draw was awarded to Catharine Hill and her brother, Thomas, Winged Foot, with 90-21-69. Third low net went to Mrs. Cralle and Mr. Robb with 85-13-72. The Ugelow-Feldman team had 88-15-73 as did Mrs. Richard Britt, Ridgeway and Mr. B. Friedlander, Fenway, 87-15-73. Last year's champions, Mrs. Thomas Hory and her brother, Mr. B. Curry, Winged Foot, did not defend their title.
