

WCC ladies win Intersectional

Jack Nicklaus and Kathy Whitworth are back in the golf headlines.

And so are the Women of Westchester Country Club, who last weekend, turned in a surprisingly easy victory in the Women's Metropolitan Intersectional Team Championship at Crestmont, N.J.

It was, in the opinion of no less an authority than Ellie Lazare of Scarsdale, president of the sponsoring WMGA, "an inspiring conquest, and perhaps the start of a dynasty on the part of the Westchester women."

The WCC queens of metropolitan clubs are:

Charlotte DeCozen, who played at No. 1; Regine Hawes, No. 2; Ann Chambless, No. 3; Martha Dursi, No. 4, and Martha Lanier, No. 5.

In the intersectional final against the Piping Rock Club team from Long Island and Somerset Hills of New Jersey, the Westchester women romped to a 10-point victory piling up 22½ points. Somerset Hills was second with 12-one-half points. Piping Rock was third with 9½.

Westchester succeeds Stanwich of Connecticut as Met Team champion. Piping Rock had dominated previously.

Regine Hawes, former WCC club champion, and Mrs. Lanier were the big guns for the victorious WCC quintet. Both romped to six point triumphs, blanking their Long Island and Jersey rivals in the process.

Mrs. Chambless and Mrs. Dursi collected four points each in the Nassau format (a point for each nine, a point for the

match), while Ms. DeCozen won two and one half points.

Westchester wasted little time demonstrating its superiority with four of the five WCC members matching or bettering par for the first nine holes. The rest was easy.

The WMGA Intersectional Team Championship culminates the month-long Interclub competition and is designed to establish the best club women's team in the Metropolitan district.

The Westchester women were convincing indeed.
